Election Update

Larry Lomax and Monica Simmons serve on the State HAVA committee and plan to share the various election changes further at our annual meeting. In the meantime, below you will find a "cliff note" version of what we can look forward to in the upcoming elections.



Nevada Voters Will See Changes in the 2004 Elections

Largely as a result of the federally enacted Help America Vote Act, Nevada's legislators enacted several changes to Nevada's election statutes in the 2003 legislative session and the Secretary of State directed additional changes, all of which will significantly impact the manner in which future elections are conducted in the state of Nevada.



Registering to Vote

The last date an individual can register to vote has been extended. Previously, the last day to register for an election was the 5th Saturday before the election

Nevada Municipal Clerks' Association (e.g., October 2 for the November 2 election). Now, if an individual fails to meet that deadline, for the 10 days immediately following the traditional deadline, an individual can still register by appearing in person at the office of the clerk/registrar for a state/county election or in the office of the city clerk for a municipal election.



Identification Requirements

Although most voters did not realize it, in the past individuals could register to vote in the state of Nevada and vote without ever showing any form of identification. Authentication of the voter was accomplished solely by matching his or her signature with the signature on the voter's original registration form. Now, if an individual registers without providing identification, the individual will have to provide identification at the polling place the first time he or she votes. If the individual fails to provide identification, the individual will not be able to vote in a municipal election and will only be allowed to vote provisionally for federal candidates in a federal election.



Provisional Voting

When a voter votes provisionally, it means the voter will be allowed to cast a ballot, but the ballot will be set aside until it is determined whether or not the voter was authorized to vote in the election. In Nevada, provisional voting will only be authorized for federal contests (U.S. President, Senate and Congress). There are two instances in which a voter will vote provisionally. First, as mentioned above, if a voter is required to present identification and does not, the voter will be allowed to cast a provisional ballot. That ballot will only be counted if the voter brings

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identification to the registrar's office prior to 5:00 p.m. on the Friday following the election. Second, if a voter's name is not on the rolls but the voter attests he or she did register to vote, the voter will be allowed to cast a provisional ballot. That ballot will only be counted if subsequent research indicates the voter had previously registered and a mistake had been made.



No More Punch Cards

Punch cards will no longer be used for absentee (mail) ballots in Clark County. As a result of the Secretary of State decertifying punch cards in Nevada, Clark County will switch to optical scan ballots for voters who chose to vote by mail. To vote on an optical scan ballot, the voter completes an arrow that points to the selected candidate's name.



Touchscreen Voting and a Voter Verified Paper Trail

The Secretary of State has also mandated that all counties in Nevada, with the exception of Clark County, convert to touchscreen voting machines, each equipped with a voter verified paper trail device (nicknamed Verivote) by the 2004 primary election. These devices will print out the voter's selections on a strip of paper and the voter can verify the selections have been accurately recorded. The 740 touchscreen machines used in Clark County will each be equipped with a Verivote device in 2004. Every Election Day polling place will have at least one touchscreen machine and all

early voting locations will use only the touchscreen machines with the Verivote printers. In addition, Clark County will continue to use its more than 2,000 full-face ballot electronic voting machines. These machines rely on older technology and there currently is no printing device that has been certified for use with these machines. However, the Secretary of State has mandated that they be equipped with a verification device by 2006. [R]

Region VIII Conference News


